



MEDICARE PART D FAST FACTS: **NEW YORK 2009**

MEDICARE BENEFICIARIES IN NEW YORK

- 2,860,851 Medicare beneficiaries.¹
- 2,403,204 Medicare Part D enrollees.¹
- 558,058 Dual Eligibles (Medicare beneficiaries who also receive Medi-Cal).¹
- 721,725 Low Income Subsidy recipients (including Dual Eligibles).¹
- 129,021 Medicare beneficiaries with no drug coverage who could be eligible for the Low Income Subsidy.²

CHANGES TO FULL SUBSIDY PLANS FROM 2008

- 8 of the 15 plans available to low-income beneficiaries for no monthly premium in 2008 will not be available for no monthly premium in 2009.³
- Over 186,000 low income beneficiaries will have to change plans to maintain a \$0 premium.⁴
 - Approximately 141,000 will be reassigned to a new plan by CMS.⁴
 - Approximately 45,000 will have to switch plans on their own to avoid a premium in 2009.⁴

FULL SUBSIDY PLANS IN 2009

- 9 plans available to low-income beneficiaries for no monthly premium in 2009.³

2009 PLAN OFFERINGS

- In 2008, the least expensive plan in New York cost \$16.70 (First Health Part D-Secure). In 2009 that plan's premium will rise to \$26.40 – a 58% increase.³
- In 2009, the least expensive plan in New York (GHI Medicare Prescription Drug Plan) will cost \$19.60 – more than 15% more expensive than 2008's least expensive plan.³
